#### The Barbour Group's Surety Bond Assistance Program for Hensel Phelps Construction Succeeds in Increasing Pool of Qualified Small and Minority Contractors

The Barbour Group, WBC member and Maryland-based surety brokerage known for its passionate approach to helping small businesses find bonding solutions, is achieving remarkable success with its Surety Bonding Assistance Program for general contracting giant Hensel Phelps Construction.

Hensel Phelps, one of the largest general contractors in the nation, reached out to The Barbour Group for help in developing a pool of qualified (i.e., bondable) small and minority contractors.

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
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year's Future 50 winners represented diverse industries, including technology, health, finance, real estate, insurance, biotech and many others.

#### Tompkins Builders Celebrates 100 Years of Building in Washington, DC

The company's first contract was in the amount of six dollars for the repair of a coping machine at the People's Drug Store at the southwest corner of 7th and E Streets, NW. Today, Tompkins, a subsidiary of Turner Construction Company, offers a full range of construction-related services in both the private and public sectors throughout the Mid-Atlantic region.

"We are proud to mark the significant occasion of our centennial. This achievement is a testament to the legacy and commitment first set forth by our founder Charles H. Tompkins in 1911," said Ed Small, who has lead Tomkins for the past 15 years as the fourth president of the company.

During its 100-year history, Tompkins Builders has managed the construction of many landmarks and signature



buildings in the nation's capital, including the construction of the iconic Lincoln Memorial Reflecting Pool in 1922; the East Wing of the White House in 1942, that today houses the Office of the First Lady and her staff; the restoration of the historic Blair Lee House in 1943, that serves as the official guest house for visitors of the President of the United States; the Robert A. Taft Memorial and Carillon located north of the Capitol in 1958; the East Wing of the National Gallery of Art, dedicated by President Jimmy Carter in 1978; the 3.1 million square foot Ronald Reagan **Building and International Trade Center** and the National World War II Memorial on the National Mall.

Throughout the years, Charles
Tompkins and his company formed
many lasting relationships in
Washington, DC, including a personal
friendship with President Eisenhower.
Charles Tompkins became a frequent

visitor to the White House during Eisenhower's presidency and managed the renovations of Eisenhower's home and farm in Gettysburg, PA in 1955. Tompkins' relationships and reputation have also led to ongoing opportunities to work with clients many times over several decades. After successfully completing the original CIA headquarters building in 1961, Tompkins Builders was selected to construct the new headquarters complex for the CIA thirty years later in 1991. In 1947, Tompkins Builders managed the construction of Federal Office Building 4 and today continues

its partnership with the General Services Administration by managing renovations to Federal Office Building 8 to accommodate approximately 2,000 Health and Human Services and House of Representatives committee staff members.

In the past five years, Tompkins has completed more than \$1.4 billion of construction in the Washington, DC area with projects that have included the 1.5 million square foot Station Place I & II, which serves as the Securities and **Exchange Commission Headquarters** adjacent to Union Station in 2005; the **Gaylord National Resort and Convention** Center on 41 acres along the Potomac River in 2008; and St. Elizabeths Hospital, featuring a 28,000 square foot green roof, in 2009. Tompkins is also a proud member of the building team for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial, which is scheduled to open in August 2011.

"Building on our company's history and strength, Tompkins is well-positioned to deliver the highest level of service in the industry as we look forward to another one hundred years of successfully delivering projects for our clients and for the communities in which we build," said Small.

# Centennial Contractors Enterprises Assembles and Gives Dozens of Bicycles to Children from the Boys & Girls Club.

Eighteen boys and girls experienced the thrill of receiving their first bikes this year, thanks to a donation from Centennial Contractors Enterprises. The donation was part of a team building activity during the contractor's annual Leadership Conference, which was held in Warrenton, VA this year. David Sturdevant, director of training at Centennial, organized the activity by partnering with Repario which facilitates experiential learning seminars.

Ninety of Centennial's managers and directors split into 18 teams and were given 25 minutes to assemble a bicycle. Minutes into the work, facilitators informed the teams that the bicycles were a donation to the local Warrenton Boys & Girls Club and read letters from a few of the children on what a bike would mean to them. The kids streamed into the room abuzz with excitement. The kids examined their new bikes and talked with their Centennial teams. The Boys & Girls Club of Fauquier County, VA has two locations and is open everyday. It serves 130 kids, ages six to 18, per day. Before breaking for the day, Centennial managers assembled six additional bicycles to donate to the Boys & Girls Club. In addition, Repario matched Centennial's donation and gave 24 additional refurbished bicycles, making the total 48 bikes to kids.

#### HKS Promotes Architectural Career Exploration at Watkins Elementary

In the fall of 2010, the HKS Washington, DC office participated in a volunteer program with the Washington Architectural Foundation, Architecture in the Schools (AIS). AIS matches volunteer architects with public school teachers to enrich the learning experience of children—bridging the gap between what is learned in school and everyday life.

HKS volunteers Shantee Jamison and Amber Wirth collaborated with teachers Viola Leak and Marva Berry to develop an eight-week syllabus focused on sustainability and architecture for a 3rd grade art/science class at Watkins Elementary. The students learned about the basics of architecture through structure and how it is adapted around the world based on available materials and climate. A trip to the National Building Museum's Lego exhibit reinforced architectural lessons learned in the classroom though a familiar medium of creativity.


The students explored local architecture on a neighborhood scavenger hunt and by performing a site analysis of their school environment. They learned about building systems through parallel relationships to the human body and created collages of conceptual ideas of their final projects inspired by discussions and precedence found in architectural magazines.

The final semester project included a schematic model of a sustainable tree house. HKS volunteers Herb Blain and Brian Szymanski helped design and build the model tree. Students designed, developed, planned and constructed model tree houses through journals, collages and physical models. The project allowed students the opportunity to envision how they could sustainably contribute to their environment through the familiar architectural form of architecture of a tree house.

This was HKS's 3<sup>rd</sup> year of participating in AIS. HKS pledges one percent of the firm's billable hours to serve the public good through architectural centric projects via the 1% Solution program, sponsored by Public Architecture.

All in all the team prepared with DC Central Kitchen enough food to serve 3,000 DC residents, accumulated 30 toys and \$400 for "Toys for Tots", and collected 4,000 canned food items for Carpenter's Shelter in Old Town Alexandria.

The National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency
Campus East The National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency
Campus East project team carves out time each month to
perform a community service project. To help facilitate the
planning and logistics of each event, the team has formed a
Social and Service Committee. In September, ten team members helped out at the Capital Area Food Bank to commemorate 9/11. The volunteers sorted nearly 10,000 pounds of food
to be distributed to area homeless shelters. They also unloaded
bags and boxes of food from trucks in the drop off area.

Clark Logistics For several years, the Clark Logistics group has volunteered to run the "petting zoo," as part of the National Building Museum's annual Festival of the Building Arts. The whole department participates, including drivers, operators, supervisors and volunteers to clean and polish the equipment so that it looks its best for the public appearance. Clark volunteers also interacted with visitors, posed for photos, and supervised children as they experienced first-hand how to operate a real piece of construction equipment.

Johns Hopkins New Clinical Building For the second straight year, the Johns Hopkins Hospital New Clinical Building project team took part in Baltimore's Canstruction competition. Sponsored by the American Institute of Architects Baltimore Chapter, Canstruction challenges teams of designers, architects, builders, and engineers to create giant sculptures using cans of food. This year, the team recreated their project's Children's Tower and its curved, colorful curtain wall. The team used more than 2,200 cans of food to complete the model. After being on display, all the competition's sculptures were disassembled and all canned goods were donated to the Maryland Food Bank.

U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Chemical Defense Members of the Clark and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers project teams at U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Chemical Defense (USAMRICD) hosted a group of high school students in June. The students were part of

the "Engineering the Future" summer program designed for students interested in math, science and engineering. The day began with a short safety orientation, followed by a series of presentations about the USAMRICD project's design and construction process. Aspects of the tour which students found most fascinating included a presentation on three-dimensional modeling and MEP coordination, and a demonstration of surveying with a robotic total station. The day ended with a fall protection presentation, which provided a chance to try on a body harnesses and inspect safety equipment.

Preconstruction Services Department Sleet, blizzards and ice could not stop Clark's Preconstruction Services Department from collecting chairs, night tables, bake-ware and over ten televisions to benefit Airman's Attic this winter. Located on Andrews Air Force Base, Airman's Attic provides gently-used goods for families of junior Airmen, rank E-1 to E-5. All items are free, easing the financial pressures on military families. Four collections were organized over the month of February and Clark employees dropped off enough items to fill a U-Haul truck.

Clark Mid-Atlantic Region Clark's Mid-Atlantic Region employees, subcontractors and friends fought off late February's low temperatures, 50-mile-per-hour winds, and a threat of snow to help raise much-needed funds for victims of the Haiti earthquake. The Help for Haiti fundraiser began as a Clark activity, but as news of the event spread, subcontractors and friends of Clark employees also wanted to get involved. More than 30 employees from Clark and Clark Enterprises helped organize, volunteered to work, or donated silent auction and raffle items to the Help for Haiti fundraiser. 

**April 2010** Balfour Beatty employees and guests volunteer at Washington, DC's So Others Might Eat to serve food for people in need.

**April 2010** Six Balfour Beatty employees helped fix-up a home in Falls Church, VA, through the WBC's Rebuilding Together event. They spent the day clearing out an enormous amount of junk from the backyard, painting the kitchen and living room, laying new carpet and other fix-up tasks.

Mona Gives Back Through Christmas in April and Susan and Andrew Mona Foundation

Christmas in April\*Prince George's County Mona Electric Group, has proudly organized and sponsored Christmas in April Prince George's County for many years. It is its principal charitable activity, and it devotes much time and effort to it. The Prince George's County program was founded in 1989 under the leadership of Vincent "Cap" Mona of Mona Electric and the Prince George's County Government under the leadership of then County Executive Parris N. Glendening. Christmas in April is a non-denominational volunteer organization that repairs the homes of senior citizens who are either low-income and/or physically challenged so they may live in warmth, safety, and independence. The actual repair work occurs in a single day: the last Saturday in April. The program has grown from helping 30 homeowners in 1989 with 600 volunteers to helping 96 homeowners in 2010 with the help of 3,500 volunteers. In 22 years of serving homeowners in Prince George's County, Christmas in April has repaired 2,000 homes with the assistance of 65,700 volunteers. The dollar value of the donated work and materials totals more than \$34 million.

Besides donating office space to Christmas in April for the past 22 years, Mona sponsors a home each year. Mona Electric's 2010 home was located in Temple Hills. Over 40 volunteers replaced the sliding door, garage door, landscaped, painted and replaced fixtures. This program not only brings joy to these homeowners, but it allows every volunteer to see and feel this joy as they work side by side with fellow county residents.

The Susan and Andrew Mona Foundation The Susan and Andrew Mona Foundation was founded in 1992, named in memory of Cap Mona's late wife and son whom both passed away from cancer. The foundation's mission is to strengthen the community by reaching out to our neighbors who are experiencing difficult and unfortunate situations in their lives by assisting them with their health and educational needs. The foundation is in its third year of granting three Bishop McNamara High School students each a \$1,000 scholarship to continue their Holy Cross education. The foundation continues its local outreach through such organizations Special Olympics, Habitat for Humanity, Northern High School, SOME and Sisters of Mercy to name only a few. As the foundation looks towards is 20 years it has contributed nearly \$200,000 to those in need.

The DPR Foundation "We will be as integral and indispensable to the communities we operate in as the Boys and Girls Clubs and The Red Cross" has been a long-term

**Adoptive Families** DPR adopted four families this holiday season from two organizations. Great support from employees meant DPR was able to provide the families with toys, warm clothes and food.

**Soldier's Angels** These are families of young enlisted soldiers who are struggling to have a festive holiday celebration. The goal of adoption is to help military families in need with presents for their children and a grocery gift card or prepaid Visa gift card to purchase their holiday dinner and trimmings.

**Our Daily Bread** This organization connects individuals, families, businesses and community groups with families in need throughout the Fairfax County area to provide Thanksgiving and December Holiday meals and presents for children.

**Childhelp** DPR purchased a table for the fourth Capitol CAREaoke fundraiser. This annual fundraiser provides resources for children who need Childhelp's services. Childhelp exists to meet the physical, emotional, educational, and spiritual needs of abused, neglected and at-risk children. They focus their efforts on advocacy, prevention, treatment and community outreach.

Also, Southland Concrete participates in many annual charitable events including Joe Gibbs Youth for Tomorrow, Erin Peterson Fund, Wounded Warriors, Habitat for Humanity golf tournaments as well as black-tie galas supporting American Heart Association and sponsors numerous local youth sport events.

## **Member Projects**



After a yearlong design competition, **SK&A Structural Engineers** announced the beginning of design on the new **Dunbar Senior High School** located in Washington, DC. The project consists of a new multi-story high school with a total area of approximately 250,000 GSF and a construction budget of \$92 million. In addition to conventional classrooms and administrative spaces, the project will feature a natatorium, competition gymnasium, and two-story atrium. The new school, scheduled to open in time for the 2013-14 academic year is being designed to accommodate 1,100 students, replacing the virtually windowless, 1970s-vintage existing facility on New Jersey Avenue NW. Alumni include Charles Drew, Duke Ellington, the District's current Congressional Representative, Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton (D) and District Mayor Vincent C. Gray (D).

Coakley & Williams Construction has broken ground on the Washington Highlands Library in Washington DC. The \$13 million project was designed by David Adjaye and is scheduled for completion in December 2011.

Clark Construction Group, has reached substantial completion on the U.S. Institute of Peace Headquarters project. Built on one of the last available

sites at the northwest corner of the National Mall, the building is notable for its eye-catching design and high-quality craftsmanship. The five-story, 150,000 square feet concrete structure was designed with 3 distinct wings flanking 2 atria. A five-story curtain wall system at the front of one of the atria creates a grand hall. The top three stories of the Institute's headquarters contain office space for the organization's staff. Each individual office has an exterior window or an interior window overlooking an atrium below. Additional building facilities include a 230-seat theater, seven conference rooms, a 2,000 square feet outdoor terrace, a two-level underground parking garage, and a landscaped exterior plaza with curving retaining walls.

One of the project's most notable aspects is its roof. The building's two curving roofs are designed to evoke the image of the wings of a dove. From the exterior, they appear white during the day and glow from soft light within at night. The roofs are constructed of a steel frame and nearly 1,500 white translucent glass panels. The south roof has a 12,000 square feet surface area and spans 80 feet between buildings; the north roof has a 7,500 square feet surface area and spans 55 feet. One of the south roof's "wings"

extends 40 feet away from the building toward the nearby Lincoln Memorial. Project partners include concrete contractor; **John J. Kirlin**, Rockville, MD, mechanical and plumbing contractor; **Mona Electric Group**, Clinton, MD, electrical contractor.

Applying all five of the American Institute of Architects' (AIA) key principles of integrated project delivery (IPD), **Balfour Beatty Construction** and its IPD team recently delivered 26,000 square feet of interior space in **Lincoln Property Company's Bridgewater Corporate Center** in Fairfax, VA. The project represents one of only a few dozen "true" IPD projects to reach completion, according to the AIA.

IPD is a cutting-edge project delivery method structured around a highly collaborative team of owner, architect, contractor, and other key stakeholders, a process characterized by more reliable information and open sharing of project goals, risks, and rewards. The result is increased value to the owner and reduced waste and inefficiencies through all phases of design, fabrication, and construction.

Completed within budget and on schedule for timely occupancy, the space—which covers the entire fifth floor of the Class A building—purposefully showcases sustainable features to help educate employees and visitors about the sustainable, collaborative, efficient, and state-of-the-art office environment. Designed and built to achieve the U.S. Green Building Council's LEED Gold certification, the area serves as Balfour Beatty's new North Region headquarters and achieves the goal of a sustainable work environment that supports the efficient teamwork and interdisciplinary collaboration inherent to successful team-based project delivery.

The Maryland Stadium Authority has selected **Coakley & Williams Construction, Inc.** as its construction manager for renovations and restoration work at **Orioles Park at Camden Yards** and at the historic **Camden Yards Warehouse.** 

The U.S. Green Building Council has awarded the U.S. General Ser-

vices Administration its LEED® Gold certification for the Food & Drug **Administration's Center for Devices** and Radiological Health (CDRH) building, also known as Building 66, on the FDA's new headquarters campus in Silver Spring, MD Tishman Construction Corporation of Maryland (TCC), in a joint venture with Heery International, managed the construction of the six-story, 396,000 square-foot office building, which houses approximately 1,100 FDA employees. The joint-venture saved taxpayers \$2 million on the project while completing construction three months ahead of schedule and raising the building's LEED rating from Silver to Gold at no additional cost to taxpayers.

Tishman and Heery previously assisted the GSA in achieving certification of several other buildings on the campus. They assisted in obtaining one LEED Gold rating—for historic Building 1-in April, and one Silver rating-for the Central Shared Use Facility—at the \$1.4-billion FDA headquarters project. The FDA is pursuing three more Silver certifications and one more Gold one on the 130-acre campus. The FDA Headquarters Consolidation Project includes renovation of three historic buildings and construction of 17 new buildings, totaling 5.3 million square feet of new laboratories and offices. Tishman and Heery has also managed construction of a central utility plant and parking garages for approximately 5,900 vehicles. Eleven buildings have been completed and are occupied, five are under construction, and several are in the planning, programming or design phase. The project also includes building all new site utilities and infrastructure, more than 21/2 miles of roads, and two new bridges. Completion is anticipated for 2013.

EEC of DC / Forrester Construction Company joint venture successfully completed the DOES (Department of Employment Services) project, which was celebrated at a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on December 16, 2010. Those in attendance included Robin-Eve Jasper, Director of the DC Department of Real Estate Services; Joseph P. Walsh





Jr., Director of DOES; and Congresswoman Eleanor Holmes Norton.

This \$65 Million, LEED™ (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Silver project involved the construction of a 280,000 square feet, five-story headquarters for DOES. This agency plans, develops, and administers employment related services to all segments of the Washington,

DC metropolitan population including job training, workers' compensation, and unemployment compensation.

The Joint Venture of EEC of DC and Forrester Construction Company exceeded the District-Based Certified Business goal for this project by 70% and over 162,000 man-hours of work were performed by DC resident craftsmen in making this building a reality.

The construction effort created 47 new positions, which were filled by District residents via the Department of Employment Services One-Stop program. Job training was provided to 38 District residents through a registered apprenticeship program and an additional 18 District residents of Ward 7 were employed through the Marshall Heights Community Development Organization's Workforce Development Program.

LEED™ elements at the DOES Headquarters include daylight harvesting, alternative transportation including bicycles and public transportation, green roof, low emitting lighting, rapidly renewable materials, regionally manufactured materials, recycled content, low flush toilets and flush less urinals, construction waste recycling, indoor air quality, and low-emitting materials.

International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local Union 26 (IBEW Local 26) appointed Bethesda, MD-based Frost Miller Group (FMG) to develop a new website for the organization which represents 7,500 unionized electricians in the Washington area. IBEW Local 26 has had a long-standing relationship with the integrated marketing communications firm through the Electrical Alliance—a joint effort of the Washington, DC **Chapter of the National Electrical Contractors Association (NECA)** and IBEW Local 26 that promotes the union electrical construction industry. Frost Miller brings experience from developing compelling marketing and public relations campaigns for the Electrical Alliance. FMG previously designed cross-platform websites for the Electrical Alliance and its apprenticeship program, the Washington, DC Joint Apprenticeship Training Committee.






