Grunley Employees Donate Time All Year Long

Through outreach initiatives, volunteer efforts and philanthropic contributions, Grunley Construction is committed to giving back, and enhancing the quality of life of less fortunate citizens within the communities in which we live. Several of the community activities Grunley participated in during 2009 are described below.

Rebuilding Together On April 25th, Grunley colleagues participated in *Rebuilding Together*. Its programs include a day shelter for chronically homeless adults; emergency, temporary and transitional housing; comprehensive case management; life skills and educational classes for current residents and shelter graduates; and an education fund. In a "Spring Cleaning" effort, our team helped scrub, mop, and organize several communal areas, including the library, as well as wash down and sanitize their supply of hypothermia mats.

Susan G. Komen Global Race for the Cure On June 6th, Grunley sponsored a team of approximately 30 colleagues, friends, and family who walked 5K (3.1 miles) in support of the *Susan G. Komen Foundation* and the global fight against breast cancer.

American Red Cross Blood Drive On September 3rd, Grunley held its annual Blood Drive for the American Red Cross. In all 18 pints of blood were donated this year.

DCBIA's Community Improvement Day On September 12, 20 Grunley staff members, family, and friends participated in the DCBIA's 17th Annual Community Improvement Day. As their 2009 hallmark project, DCBIA elected to restore and revitalize Fort Mahan Park in Northeast, Washington, DC. The Grunley Volunteer Team was primarily focused on the landscaping of the grounds and pathways surrounding the playfields and sport courts. Grunley volunteers also led other projects, specifically: demolishing a deserted pool house, infilling an abandoned swimming pool, installing a new basketball court, repairing existing fencing and other site elements; and installing new chain link fencing around the project site.

Interfaith Clothing Center Interfaith Works is renovating its Interfaith Clothing Center in Rockville, MD. The makeover is the first time in over 30 years that the facility has been renovated. This project has been funded by Montgomery County, the Washington Architectural Foundation, and Architect Sherry Nevins of Retail Details. Grunley Construction provided pro-bono construction services to install the new store fixtures.

Turner Construction Company Participates in DC Schools Beautification Day and More

A team of Turner employees, along with their family and friends, and Sub-Partners B&B Flooring, Chiaramonte Construction, F&L Construction, Flaglers Hardware, MET Painters, and a few DC government agencies' volunteers participated in the Mayor's Beautification Day at Kramer Middle

School, in Southeast, Washington, DC on August 22, 2009 in preparation for the first day of school. The Turner team painted classrooms, and the principals office, landscaped the grounds and laid carpet in a classroom. Turner has participated with this program for the last few years.

Turner's 3rd Feed the Homeless Day A team of volunteers participated in the 3rd annual Turner Feed the Homeless Day on Thursday, April 9, 2009. More than 100 hungry individuals in the DC metro communities were fed. Volunteers provided food, oversized bagged meals and McDonald's gift cards to feed those in need. This program is one of the many offered through Arlington Street People's Assistance Network and Arlington-Alexandria Coalition for the Homeless the advocacy agencies for the homeless. Washington, DC-based Chiaramonte Construction Company provided monetary support for this effort.

Duane Morris LLP has a history of involvement with Dress for Success, an organization with a mission to promote the economic independence of disadvantaged women by providing professional attire. Duane Morris' Washington, DC office not only continued the tradition of organizing a drive for Dress for Success, but also acted on the requests of the firm's male attorneys and staff to participate in a similar organization targeting men's professional attire. From this, Career Gear made its mark on Duane Morris' charitable resume. Similar to Dress for Success, Career Gear's goal is to provide appropriate business clothing for job seekers in addition to services and resources that help its clients in retaining employment and advancing in the workplace. In 2009, the Washington, D.C. office collected eight large packing boxes and 14 garment bags of clothing for Career Gear and five boxes of working attire for Dress for Success, including shoes and handbags. In addition to collecting these invaluable donations, individuals from Duane Morris did the heavy lifting for the delivery.

AECOM Employees Devote Time and Money to National and Local DC Charities

Every year, AECOM employees participate in various charity events. From renovating houses through Rebuilding Together to collecting needed items for underprivileged families, AECOM's Washington, DC area employees are dedicated to helping those in need. Some of the DC area offices' larger contributions are highlighted in the following paragraphs.

DC Employees participated in the Annual Susan G. Komen National Race for the Cure® held in the nation's capital on June 6, 2009. In the months preceding the 5K race, the 22 team members turned to co-workers, family, and friends to exceed their fundraising goal and raise \$2,180. This was the third year in a row that AECOM participated in the race; to date, the team has raised more than \$6,000 to help fund breast cancer treatment programs and breast cancer research.

In a global community outreach event to support the Maasai Wilderness Conservation, AECOM raised over \$80,000 by sponsoring nine AECOM runners in the New York City Marathon that took place November 1, 2009. The money raised by the Maasai Marathon team (a larger group of 30 runners, which included celebrities like Ed Norton and Alanis Morrissette, other corporate firms, and Maasai warriors themselves) will help the Maasai people in Africa by promoting conservation, education, and health services within the community. The Maasai are an indigenous African ethnic group of semi-nomadic people located in Kenya; the Maasai Wilderness Conservation Trust helps to preserve the Maasai way of life and the tribal lands in which they live.

For the past three years AECOM's National Capital Office has participated in the US Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots Program. AECOM's local office has donated over 150 toys to the program. AECOM hopes to continue their support of Toys for Tots for years to come and help the organization complete their objective of helping, "Less fortunate children throughout the US experience the joy of Christmas."

Boston Properties Focuses on Children's Needs

Each year Boston Properties participates in a variety of national and local community improvement initiatives, and 2009 was no different. Since 2000, every December employees of the Washington, DC regional office partner with Childhelp to purchase and deliver holiday gifts to 60 at-risk children at Childhelp's Village East in central Virginia. The Alice C. Tyler Village of Childhelp is a safe and secure residential treatment facility providing a continuum of healing services for severely abused, neglected and at risk children. Children receive physical, mental, emotional and spiritual rehabilitation. Admission ages range from five through 14 for both genders, with an average length of stay between 8-12 months. Additionally, Boston Properties employees partnered with the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, United Way, the Race with Alan Webb (a charity providing school supplies to kids in local schools), and the March of Dimes.

Tompkins Teams with Toys for Tots

Tompkins Builders was again a proud sponsor of and participant in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots Program during the holiday season of 2009. It was particularly important, given the current state of the economy, that Tompkins made this its most successful year ever. By joining together and enlisting all available resources, it succeeded in delivering the message of hope to the needy youngsters that were served by this program. All were encouraged to give what they could, whether it be in time or toys, and share in the reward of knowing that they helped someone less fortunate. During the collection period, December 1st-18th, Tompkins placed boxes for toy collection available for pickup in both our office and the lobby of our office's building and at every project jobsite. Participation at every level was encouraged, from tradesmen in the field to project managers, the main office personnel, and our network of joint venture partners and clients. Through a series of e-mail blasts, posted flyers and word-of-mouth encouragement, every person in the office or on the jobsites knew that Tompkins was collecting toys and many employees and associates donated generously to the cause. The most notable collection was through the C4ISR project in Aberdeen, MD. Aronson Gives More Than \$70,000 to Various Causes

Kelly Generator Supports Local Charity Efforts



Twelve parents drove and 24 scouts labored to deliver all bags by 2:00 pm that day. This was best troop fundraiser ever, and the Boy Scout Troop really appreciated Kelly Generator & Equipment Inc.'s support. Proceeds are used to purchase new troop equipment and to repair existing equipment, as well as to help fund summer camp for the boys.

Local Creek Making Big Waves in Cleansing

Patuxent Watershed Calvert County's St. Leonard Creek became the eighth creek this year in the Coastal Conservation Association Maryland's oyster restoration project. Under the leadership of father-daughter Creek Captains John and Laura Kelly, 25 homeowners on St. Leonard Creek and five volunteer

Kelly, 25 homeowners on St. Leonard Creek and five volunteers from CCA MD's Patuxent River Chapter placed 100,000 oysters in 100 cages which were hung from piers on the creek. The













efforts have raised the number of oysters distributed this summer to 750,000. An adult oyster can filter up to 50 gallons of water each and every day. The CCA MD project is a joint activity between recreational anglers, local homeowners, businesses and government. Dominion Resources, which operates the Cove Point liquefied natural gas facility in Calvert County, supported the CCA project with a \$25,000 grant earlier this year, and it is part of Governor O'Malley's Marylanders Grow Oysters program. Kelly Generator and Equipment, Inc., of Owings supported the launch, providing staff work and resources.

A Holy Mission to End Hunger End Hunger has coordinated with local businesses to provide free services to people toeing the poverty line. In addition to handling food donations, End Hunger helps three or four people at a time, with candidates drawn from the Chesapeake Cares Food Pantry operated by Chesapeake Church in Huntingtown. Kelly Generator and Equipment has been involved with this since 2008 by donating warehouse space for the program to organize and ship goods to the hungry families. The in house employees all worked on a rotating schedule to donate time to organizing the food and other items in order for it to be shipped to the pantries.

Truland Service Supported Several Causes Throughout 2009

Luke's Wings Truland Service donated \$15,000 to Luke's Wings this year, which was raised from the annual golf outing at Whiskey Creek. In addition, Tony Esteve, project manager, is a Board Member for Luke's Wings.

Hospital Hospitality House Truland Service has been supporting HHH by participating in the SAVOR fund raising weekend, which raised more than \$200k for the HHH. This \$200k was used to add equipment to the pediatric floor. TS also participated in a restaurant walk and several other events to help raise money and awareness of HHH. Yvette Freeman, director of business development, is a board member of HHH.

Neighborhood Resource Center This year Truland Service supported the NRC by donating time and materials to build a kitchen so that after school snacks and weekend meals can be prepared. TS also sponsored the Run To The River, which raised more than \$35,000. The money pays for 16 kids to attend the pre-school for free along with providing books, supplies and teaching materials for the Montessori School for one year. In addition, TS adopted many of the NRC children for Christmas this year and is providing food, toys and clothing for 31 children and their families for the holidays. Yvette Freeman also is a board member for the NRC.

Food & Friends Truland Service has participated in the Holiday Food Drive as well as meal delivery one weekend a month to more than 45 individuals.

Extreme Makeover Home Edition Truland Service helped build the Fishing School in Washington, DC in August 2009, located in Ward 7. TS donated materials and labor, totaling over \$200,000 in addition to reaching out to builders, trades, suppliers and others to complete the project in seven days, 106 total hours. TFS is a nationally recognized youth development organization

providing children and families with academic and parental support. Since 1990, TFS has helped over 2,500 students with after school and summer school programs.

Ronald McDonald House Charities Truland Service is helping build a new, state-of-the-art facility in Washington, DC to be opened in 2011.

Inova Health System Foundation Through its partnerships with individuals, corporations and other foundations in the community, IHSF helps assure that everyone has access to health care, even when those who are in need are unable to pay for the care. Truland Service has been partnering with IHSF on many community awareness projects, fund raising efforts and community development. James Gyuras, Tony Esteve and Yvette Freeman have all worked on committees in 2009 to help support IHSF.

This year Truland Service also supported The Valley Health Foundation, Christmas in April, The Food Bank of Virginia and Adventist Hospital Foundation.

Ronald McDonald House Charities of Greater Washington, DC Balfour Beatty Construction donated preconstruction and construction services to build a new Ronald McDonald House for the families of ill children in Washington, DC.

Balfour Beatty employees and their families turned out for the Ronald McDonald House Charities Kaps for Kids Walk-A-Thon and also decorated a House of Hope and filled it with more than \$1,200 for the Ronald McDonald House Charities of Greater Washington, DC.

Adopt-A-Highway In May and October, thirty-three Balfour Beatty volunteers turned out to clean the two-mile stretch of the Fairfax County Parkway that the company has adopted.

So Others Might Eat *In April, August and October*, Balfour Beatty employees volunteer at Washington, DC's So Others Might Eat (S.O.M.E.) to serve food for people in need.

Shelter House Balfour Beatty raised over \$3,700 from its Holiday Party raffle ticket sales and donated the money to Shelter House. It donated \$1,250 in gift cards and 36 toys/items of clothing to Shelter House.

Walks and Runs for Various Charities *March 2009*: Balfour Beatty employees participated in the annual Scope-it-Out 5K run to raise money for colon cancer research.

October 2009: Balfour Beatty donated \$10,000 to Hopkins House, a learning center in Alexandria, Va., for children, youth and families. The money benefits the Hopkins House Scholarship Fund.

October 2009: Balfour Beatty employees raised over \$700 for Denim Day, an event held to raise money to fight breast cancer.

Many DPR employees serve community programs and associations, serving as board members, coaches, volunteers and mentors. Highlights of the 2009 Metropolitan DC activities are described below.

Youth Learning Academy- Virginia DPR has been helping the Youth Learning Academy succeed and grow over the past two years. DPR has donated space within the Charlottesville, VA office for YLA. One of DPR project executives is an executive board member of YLA.

DPR has been involved in gaining local support for the Buford Middle School's "Garden of Learning" project, DPR assisted YLA youths by providing volunteers to teach them the process of design, procurement, construction and sales of custom doghouses for a charity event. DPR is also assisting YLA expand their Doorway2Construction program in the Charlotte Mecklenburg School district of Charlotte, NC.

ACE Mentoring- Virginia One DPR project manager has volunteered to be the chairperson for the ACE Mentoring Program in Richmond, VA. The ACE Mentor Program is a unique program whose mission is to enlighten and increase the awareness of high school students to career opportunities in architecture, construction and engineering and related areas of the design and construction industry through mentoring; and to provide scholarship opportunities for students. ACE is a unique partnership among industry professionals who volunteer

to become mentors to high school students in order to introduce them to the professions and encourage them to pursue studies and careers in these fields.

ChildHelp USA-Virginia In lieu of the annual golf tournament which raises money on behalf of ChildHelp USA, the Mid-Atlantic office incorporated several fundraising elements into the recent Subtoberfest Event this past October. ChildHelp set up a booth at the event and sold 50/50 raffle tickets to raise money for the cause. In addition to its annual contribution to the organization, DPR wrote a check to ChildHelp for \$3,000.

Rebuilding Together- DC Metro Area For the past nine years DPR has volunteered for Rebuilding Together and this year turned out to be another successful "Christmas in April!" This year DPR teamed up with A-SPAN (Arlington Street People's Assistance Network). Since DPR has the building knowledge and skill set that other groups do not have, it was asked to take on a bigger project, replacing the organization's flooring, painting, installing new washer and dryers, making significant improvements to the shower areas and building a reception area that better serves their clients. A-SPAN was very thankful for all of the work that DPR accomplished over four days.

MMYC- Maryland The DPR Foundation chose The Maryland Multicultural Youth Center–Riverdale, MD to receive a \$30,000 donation in 2009 as well as a continued commitment to provide volunteer help and secure donated materials for the building rehab and programs during 2010. The monetary support will help develop and implement programs to improve the health of the students through learning about nutrition and being more active. Healthy snacks, building/rebuilding bicycles and playtime with a "Wii" are all some of the fun in learning approach.

In addition to the monetary support in 2009 DPR obtained donations of materials and time from staff and the construction/design industry:

- Over 3,000 square feet of ceiling tile redoing the auditorium so it can be used by the community and for student activities
- Coordinated a donation from a local architecture firm of 20 "gently used " computers
- DPR staff provided First Aid & CPR training for the MMYC staff & Americorp Volunteers
- DPR staff volunteered as chaperones for a summer trip to the Smithsonian Air & Space Museum in July. One DPR lead team won the information scavenger hunt – gathering the most correct answers to questions from Smithsonian Museums
- Support for the "green" community and facility gardens

The programs that MMYC offers in Riverdale are focused on the nearby middle school and the primarily Latino community that it serves. They annually serve about 129 children aged 10-14. MMYC operates an after school and summer educational program which includes a structured week combining periods for studies, educational enjoyment and activities. Some of the ongoing activities include:

- A student and community vegetable/herb garden, irrigated from a cistern that collects and stores rain water from the roof
- A bicycle repair program that teaches map reading, math, and engineering principles (a stationary tail light assembly powered by a bike charged battery); additionally, students can volunteer hours repairing bikes and earn a bike of their own.
- After school tutoring for the students that are primarily from the William Wirt Middle School
- A program called Parents as Partners teaching parents how to navigate the public school system and be actively involved in their children's education
- A recycling program that goes beyond cans and paper but now includes a fueling station for a vegetable oil based alternative fuel
- · An after school soccer program
- An art program that through other tenants has murals commissioned by third parties such as a fire station or a school

David M. Schwarz Architects Hosts Gingertown

Each year, David M. Schwarz Architects hosts an initiative called Gingertown that brings together DC architects, designers and building industry colleagues. DMSAS creates a new master plan and invites participants to take lots to create Gingerbread structures for the town. In 2009, David. M. Schwarz Architects took its inspiration from its hometown of Washington, DC to design a master plan for Gingertown rich in character and charm. The town is complete with the Whoppergate Hotel, Embassy of Swedish Fish, Center for PEZ & Justice, Blue Raspberry Metro stop and Cherry Pop traffic circle. On December 1st, participants convened at the DMSAS offices to make Gingertown a reality. That Friday December 4th, the individual structures were donated to community based organizations including Children's National Medical Center, Martha's Table, So Others Might Eat, the Washington Home, St. Elizabeth's, My Sister's Place, and the Wendt Center for Loss & Healing. Cash donations of \$550 each, made possible by individual contributions collected at the event and through sponsorships from Davis Construction, the AIA DC Emerging Architects Committee and Whole Foods Market P Street, were also presented to recipient organizations.

EMCOR Group, Inc., a Fortune 500® leader in mechanical and electrical construction, energy infrastructure and facilities services for a diverse range of businesses announced that its Dyna**lectric Company** subsidiary has been awarded a contract for the installation of electrical systems for the new U.S. Coast Guard Headquarters in Washington, DC. Dynalectric will be responsible for the installation of the electrical systems for the nine-level, 1,300,000 square-foot base office building and two parking garages. Dynalectric will also be responsible for the installation of the electrical systems required at a 65,000 square-foot Central Utility Plant, including relocation of existing site utilities, as well as a tunnel connector to the main building. The estimated 36-month project construction schedule, including design and excavation (the facility will be constructed into a hillside, requiring the removal of one billion cubic feet of material prior to construction) commenced on October 1. The large work site, which will include a 40-trailer complex, nine cranes, and a concrete batch plant, will require 8000 amp's of temporary electrical service, which will also be installed by Dynalectric.

The **Reston Nature House** officially opened to the public with a Grand Opening ceremony on Saturday, November 21. The new building completes the Walker Nature Education Center, a 72-acre site that provides educational

programs and recreational resources to the Reston, VA community. The Nature House was constructed by HITT Con**tracting**'s Institutional team to achieve Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED®) Gold certification from the U.S. Green Building Council. If awarded, it will be the first LEED Gold building in the Hunter Mill District of Fairfax County, and one of only 17 new LEED® Gold facilities in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The construction of the Nature House includes installation of a ground source geothermal heat pump system, partial radiant flooring, and a zoned temperature management system that helps reduce energy consumption by at least 25 percent. The geothermal heat pump is complemented by Structural Insulated Paneling System (SIPS) walls, further enhancing the building's energy efficiency. HITT Contracting installed green flooring from reclaimed hardwood floors from barns in Appalachia, natural Marmoleum, and recycled carpets. The sustainable roof is made from Galvalume, a recycled steel product that lasts a lifetime, reduces heat gain, and is recyclable. The building is finished with 100 percent recycled drywall and zero VOC paints. The HITT Contracting Inc. team of Vice President Michael Bellusci, Senior Project Manager Frank Rotondo, Assistant Project Managers Jamshid Banahi and Michelle Voce, and Superintendent Mark Inman worked with the architect, Travis Ritenour of

CMSS Architects and Lucas Hoffman of Potomac Energy Group to successfully complete this project.

Tishman-AECOM, a joint-venture of Tishman Construction Corporation of DC, one of the nation's premier construction managers, contractors and owner representatives, and AECOM **Technology Corporation**, a leading provider of professional technical and management support services for government and commercial clients around the world, today announced that it has been awarded a \$16-million federal contract. The "indefinite delivery/indefinite quantity" contract covers construction-management services for Phase 1 of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) new headquarters at the former St. Elizabeth's psychiatric hospital campus, a National Historic Landmark in Washington. The Phase 1 construction program involves multiple, interdependent projects that Tishman-AECOM will manage, beginning with the new U.S. Coast Guard Headquarters building, parking structure, 80+ megawatt co-generation plant, and infrastructure projects. The overall DHS headquarters consolidation is the largest current construction project in the U.S. and the largest federal project since construction of the Pentagon. All phases of the construction program, estimated to be US\$3 billion to US\$4 billion, are scheduled for completion during 2016. B
